## **Summary Description:**

This one-story, side-gable-roofed frame building is oriented north-south and is the more northerly of two surviving, similar duplex slave houses. A shed-roofed addition runs the entire length of the west wall. The building is sided with vertical board and batten; both sections have a standing seam metal roof covering, which is a later replacement. The façade is the east wall, where two doorways provided separate access to the first-floor rooms. As a consequence of converting the structure into a shop for farm vehicles, the north doorway has been widened into a double door and the south doorway has been reconfigured as a window. The overall dimensions are 29 ft. 11<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> in. long (north-south) by 24 ft. 6 in. wide (east-west), which includes the rear addition.

Two rooms on the first floor share the central chimney, composed of brick on a stone base, with some stone also used for the fireplace interiors. The original partitions to either side of the chimney have been removed, along with numerous floor boards. Access to the two rooms in the garret originally was via a stair in each first-floor room, positioned in a rear corner and running along the end walls. The open stringer stair in the NW corner of Room 2 appears to be original, although heavily repaired; the corresponding stair in Room 1 has been removed. The opening on the west wall of Room 1 providing access to the addition is a recent cut-through, not a doorway. The wall framing is exposed on the interior and has been whitewashed.

The garret was divided by a board partition into two rooms, roughly equal in size and corresponding with the rooms below. The partition is board and batten construction, using machine-cut nails. Although unheated, the north garret room also is whitewashed, and they both are lit by gable windows, indicating that they almost certainly were intended for domestic use.

Although not original, the rear addition is framed in a similar manner and has machinecut nails, as in the Period 1 duplex; the floor is lower by 1 ft. 6 in. The addition also is partitioned into two spaces. The main block has been dendro-dated to 1858; the rear shed was not sampled and is of unknown date.

## Notes:

From the SW corner of the main house to the NE corner of the brick spring house, on a compass bearing of 197 degrees, the distance is 117 ft. From the NE corner of the spring house, to the NW corner of the northern frame duplex (prior to rear addition), on a compass bearing of 180 degrees, the distance is 131 ft. From the SE corner of the northern duplex (prior to rear addition) to north window of southern duplex/tenant house, on a compass bearing of 218 degrees, the distance is 95 ft.
