#### **Summary Description:**

The kitchen-quarter at Marmion is a frame, three-bay, one-story building, and heated garret, with a clipped side-gable roof covered with reproduction wood shingles. The structure is supported on a brick perimeter foundation, much of which has been replaced, and measures approximately 20.5 feet wide (north-south) by 36.5 feet long (east-west). A T-shaped interior brick chimney is positioned off-center to the east. The façade (north) has a central door set between evenly spaced windows, with a doorway positioned in each end wall. The fenestration of the south wall consists of a doorway in the west bay and a window in the east. The ground floor west room likely served as a cook room, as it is larger and features a substantial fireplace; it has brick nogging within the wall frame members. The smaller quartering room to the east has a smaller fireplace and formerly had plastered walls and ceiling. A doorway to the north of the fireplace allows direct access between the spaces; a closet may have been located between the south wall and the fireplace. Originally, stairs in each room led to the two additional quartering rooms in the garret, both of which had brick fireplaces. The eastern garret room had interior wall plaster, while the larger western garret room had walls finished with horizontal clapboards.

The structure has a complex construction history, with several building phases beginning in the mid-18<sup>th</sup> century. In Period 1, the structure was unheated, and a partition divided the first floor into roughly equal-sized rooms, with a roughly centered connecting doorway. A stairway for access to the attic was likely located along the west wall in the west room. In Period 2, ca. 1770, the partition was removed, the chimney and the fireplaces on both floors were installed, and a second stairway was raised in the east bay. Improvements to the building were made in the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century, consisting primarily of installing new finishes in the garret. After the Civil War, the stairway in the west room was lengthened and repositioned, and the doors and windows on the north and south walls reconfigured. Photographs of the structure made by HABS in the 1930s shows the changes to the fenestration.

In the late 1970s a series of alterations were carried out as part of an extensive campaign of renovation. The entire brick foundation was replaced along with the sills. All of the

first-floor windows and doors were rebuilt, with the latter involving reproduction wrought nails and reused period hardware. Large sections of the exterior beaded weatherboard siding were replaced, again using reproduction wrought nails. The composition shingle roof covering visible in the 1930s HABS photographs was removed and replaced with wood shingles. On the interior, builders removed much of the brick nogging in the kitchen, replacing the brick and using a Portland cement-based mortar. The original wood floors of the first story were removed and replaced with brick pavers.





During the 1970s renovation the windows were removed and most evidence for their original character and dimensions has been lost or obscured. Based on the 1930s HABS photos, the two windows on the north façade had 6/6 sashes, as compared to the current 9/6 sash windows.

Material: Wood Cladding: Horizontal – Weatherboard/lapped Beaded: Yes; many weatherboards are modern replacements, with reproduction beading and wrought nails

The ceiling joists are hewn, lapped over the wall plates. The joists measure 0.3.2 to 0.4.0 wide and are 0.7.0 to 0.8.0 high, set on two-foot centers. The sides and bottoms of the joists, along with the undersides of the floorboards above, are whitewashed. The floorboards are undercut and gauged.

After the building was converted to serve as a kitchen and quarter, Room 1 had fully plastered walls and a ceiling. Most of the riven and wrought-nailed lathing has been removed, and remnants of whitewash on the joists and studs indicate that the space was subsequently whitewashed.
