## Summary Description:

The former duplex slave quarter at New Market Plantation is located approximately onehalf mile from the main house complex. The brick, one-story, two-bay structure is approximately $30^{\prime} 6^{\prime \prime}$ by $14^{\prime} 5$ " in dimension, with walls laid in 5 to 1 common bond. The quarter was originally covered with a side-gable roof. The interior center chimney serves a fireplace in each of the two first-floor rooms, which were entered from the exterior by separate doorways symmetrically positioned on the south-facing façade. As constructed, there was no access between the rooms, which thus served as a double-quarters for separate enslaved households. One window is roughly centered on each end wall, and a single window was centered on the north wall of each of the rooms, which have been converted to doorways. There is no evidence to indicate that access to the attic was ever provided. The ceiling joists are exposed and are whitewashed along with the brick walls.

Significant modifications to the structure included removing and replacing the roof to accommodate a substantial structure that was added to what had been the rear of the quarter. The form was changed from a moderately-pitched side-gable running east-west to a north-south gable that covers the entire enlarged structure. The ghosts of the rafter feet from their attachement to a partially surviving flat false plate indicate the roughly 4 'spacing of the rafter pairs, which matches the layout of the ceiling joists. The ceiling joists had projected several inches past the wall face and have been cut off, along with a portion of the false plate. When the direction of the roof was changed, short joists were installed on the east and west to act as outriggers to support the new rafters and the projecting roof overhang. On the interior, the original wood partition walls were removed, allowing access between the rooms along the front wall; a brick wall was laid up on the north to replace the earlier board wall. The original window openings on the north wall were enlarged into doorways, which now provide direct access between the quarter and the addition. After the structure was expanded, porches with shed roofs and concrete floors were added to the east and south elevations.

The ceiling joists are a mix of sash- and pit-sawn members that measure 0.4 .0 (W) x 0.6.2 $-0.7 .0(\mathrm{H})$. The joists are set apart at a greater than usual distance: 3.6 .2 from inside to inside, on approximately 3.11 .0 centers (4.4.0 from outside to outside). The ceiling joists of both rooms are whitewashed. The unusually wide spacing of the joists likely relates to the lack of access to the attic, and thus no live load transferred to the flooring and the joists.

Nail holes revealed in the top surface of the surviving false plate on the north wall indicate that the rafters were attached with three nails every two feet.

At its base, the central chimney measures $6.0 .4(\mathrm{~N}-\mathrm{S}) \times 4.5 .0(\mathrm{E}-\mathrm{W})$. As it rises the chimney steps up and in twice to its narrower stack. Holes for woodstove pipes were inserted into the chimney above each fireplace.

## Notes

A compass reading taken at the building's SW corner, looking towards the NW corner, produced a bearing of $335^{\circ}$.

Some of the "earlier" circular-sawn flooring boards in Room 1 could be original.
On the northern side of the central chimney is a brick medial wall that is a later insertion, as it abuts both the chimney's north face and the south face of the north wall. Based on the presence of empty mortises for former wall studs, the rooms were separated by a wooden partition (medial) wall, situated directly east of the brick medial wall.

On the north wall of Room 1 is a former, original window location that later was altered into a doorway. The window jambs survive, allowing an estimate of the width and height of the original opening. The jambs were set into the wall's brickwork and their bottoms ended on a ledge about two feet above the floor.

In Room 2 a series of empty mortises on the bottom of the ceiling joist indicates the locations of studs anchoring the former, wooden partition wall.
