The University System of Maryland (USM) Board of Regents recently appointed **Darryll J. Pines**, dean of the A. James Clark School of Engineering, as the 34th president of the University of Maryland, effective July 1.


Pines, who will succeed **President Wallace D. Loh** after a decade in the position, has spent 25 years on the College Park campus, serving as both dean and the Nariman Farvardin Professor of Aerospace Engineering since January 2009. He arrived in 1995 as an assistant professor and chaired the Department of Aerospace Engineering from 2006 to 2009.

UMD Opens Doors to First Undergraduate Real Estate Program

The University of Maryland will launch a bachelor's degree program in real estate development in Fall 2021, following approval on Friday from the University of Maryland System Board of Regents and the Maryland Higher Education Commission.

The new School of Architecture, Planning and Preservation's (MAPP) program, "Real Estate and the Built Environment," will weave practical knowledge of the field, including urban planning and architecture, into a traditional finance-based curriculum. It will be one of just a handful of undergraduate real estate programs in the country administered outside of a business school.
